Visitors to the front porch of this home are greeted by a Snow Family created for a 2000 Festival of Trees "Catch a Falling Star" room. The room won a People's Choice award, and the Snow Family has decorated Jack & Marion's front porch every Christmas since.

At the holidays, the foyer is home to a 14-foot fresh cut tree nestled in the turn of the staircase.

The ornaments are part of an eclectic collection that began over 35 years ago and include both contemporary and antique decorations that hold many memories of Christmases past and friends who shared them. The owners have, of course, added a Quad City Christmas tree tradition. Can you find the pickle?

The back parlor features a 1903 Regina music box playing "Silent Night." A Yule log burns in the mission-style fireplace. The dining room table has been set for an intimate Christmas dinner for two.

The second floor parlor features a children's tree, complete with a 1950's vintage barnyard set underneath — perhaps a homemade Christmas gift of long ago? The music comes from another turn-of-the-century music box.
